






BROKEN FLOWERS

EVERYONE CAN DRAW

WHAT YOU WILL NEED:

A pencil / pen / crayon - anything you can make a mark with




Some paper / card - any surface you can draw on - this could be card from some packaging or a cereal box

BLIND DRAWING - Choose any object, person or animal. Without looking at your paper at all, draw what you see. OR - Close your eyes, and draw your object by Eeling its shape with your hand


10 SECOND CONTINUOUS LINE DRAWING - Choose any object, person or animal. Without taking your pen/pencil off the paper at all, draw your object/person. You have 10 seconds!

OPPOSITE HAND DRAWING - Choose any object, person or animal. Use the hand you don't normally use to write or carry things with to make the drawing		
FACE MIXUP DRAWING - Choose 2 to 4 people or animals. In the same drawing, draw the eyes from one person/animal, the nose from another person/animal, and the mouth and/or hair from the other person/animal		
SHADOW DRAWING - Look around for a shadow you find interesting, it could be		












A drawing of a gold weight in the shape of a fish, based on an object in the British Museum collection and originally from Ghana


1 x Scissors

5 x Loo rolls


1 x Marble or ball

Get creative




Cut two loo rolls in half lenthways

Tape the different parts together so the marble can roll from top to bottom




Add more loo rolls to make the marble run bigger and longer!

You could include what you saw, heard, smelt or felt, where you went and who with. You could write your story down and share it with friends of family by reading it or sending it in a letter or email.



PAPER WINDMILLS

Take your square and decorate one side in bright, contrasting colours. You could paint, draw, print or even use stickers. Patterns will work better than images as you will only see it in parts.

On the plain side of your paper draw 2 diagonal lines, corner to corner so that you have located the centre point. Make a dot in the centre and make a hole using a pin or small nail.


From each corner of your square, measure about 6cm along each of the diagonal lines that you have already drawn and put a small line. Cut along the diagonal line from corner to your small line.

You will now have a square with 4 sections and 8 flaps, 2 flaps on each section. On each section take one flap, fold the card without creasing the paper, in to the centre and pierce it with the same pin or nail that you used for the centre hole. Your painting will be visible on the folded part of the flap.


Repeat above on 1 flap for each section.


Secure all of the flaps to the stick with a single pin or nail.



FORAGE & ASSEMBLE

Make something from things you can find outside!

You can collect things that you find outside, or use things from around the house to make a small sculpture. This example is a cat made from pebbles and twigs, with a thin piece of slate for the face.








- (1) The pieces were glued together with PVA glue other types of glue, plasticine, blu tac or clay would also work well .

This giraffe was made by painting the head and body on a piece of paper and using clothes pegs for legs.




This owl started off as a piece of tissue that went through the wash in the pocket of a pair of trousers! The eyes, beak and feathers were painted on to bring the owl to life.


